

What is accessible information?

- Information that can be understood by disabled people.
- Information in plain language.
- Information clearly laid out.
- Information in other formats such as braille, audio and easy read.

Why is it important?

- Information that is not accessible excludes disabled people from many areas of life such as health services, education, employment, transport and recreation.
- Information that is not produced in accessible ways discriminates against some people and is potentially unlawful under the Equality Act (2010).

Why bother?

- There are about 800,000 disabled people in Scotland, about 1 in 7 of the population. They have skills to offer and money to spend on goods and services.
- Excluding disabled people as customers or employees disadvantages businesses and services.

SAIF can

- Help you make your information accessible to disabled people.
- Provide advice, support, training and good practice guides.
